


OPPOSITE: The clean, simple cabinet doors are dressed up with burgundystained accents. The island shape mimics the stepped-out sink wall, anchored by stainless steel appliances. Frank Lloyd Wright, the Prairie Style of the early 1900s promoted simple, honest designs that integrated beauty with function and favored the plentiful use of natural materials.

Years later, these same ideals shaped Stewart and Lora Shiman's plans for a new home, which







Stewart describes as "mostly Prairie, a little Oriental, quite simple." The couple worked with David A. Heigl, CKD, of CabinetWerks in Lincolnshire, Illinois, to fashion a large comfortable kitchen with an angled, multipurpose island and ample perimeter storage. The elegant cherrywood cabinetry, custom-crafted by Wood-Mode, features a two-tone finish that quietly complements natural stone counters, red oak flooring, and brushed stainless steel appliances. The crowning touch: a cherry light box—designed by Stewart—fitted with art-glass panels to house the fluorescent ceiling bulbs.—*Christina Nelson*

## Prairie Style Primer

From 1900 to 1920, the Prairie School architects influenced residential architecture across the Midwest. Rejecting Victorian and revival styles the movement created buildings that blended comfortably with the landscape. Characteristics of the style include:

- Windows with geometric patterns and stained- or art-glass panes.
- Wood trim in simple geometric shapes or wood strips used as decorative details.
- Rooms that flow into one another and are diversified in function.
